Learning outside the classroom

With around 70 students each year progressing to study Law as an undergraduate, Winstanley has fantastic success in preparing students to study the subject at university.

To enhance your learning, there are many exciting activities connected to the law which you can be involved in. Visits to the local Crown and Magistrates Courts help students to learn about the court system. For those who are keen on a career in Europe there is a trip to Paris and Brussels to visit European Institutions, as well as our very popular visit to Washington and New York. Closer to home, there is the chance to visit a local Prison and the Houses of Parliament. We have debating and public speaking training and a Model United Nations Conference.

We also have the Law Society which meets once a week which has its own democratically elected President and vice-president. The Law Society helps students not only prepare for the LNAT* but also helps them write their personal statements and prepare for university interviews.

Members of the Law society also enter the National Mock Trial competition which takes place at Manchester Crown Court. In addition to this we also have a Mooting competition against Runshaw College which is run by law undergraduates from Lancaster University. The mooting competition takes place in the court at Lancaster Castle both the mock trial and the moot are great opportunities for any budding barristers.

Study Support

When you enrol we'll make sure that you're receiving all the support you need, for example you may be entitled to extra time in your exams, you may benefit from working with a dyslexia tutor or you may simply need help with organising your time and many pieces of paper!

Academic Challenge

We also give important practical advice if you are thinking of continuing with law after Winstanley. This includes important careful discussion about the options of doing either a law degree or another undergraduate degree followed by the CPE conversion course. A key strand to our success is that we already have students at Oxford, Cambridge and other Russell Group Universities who act as mentors to A level students in coaching them on personal statements, specific tests such as the LNAT* and interview technique. We also have students that currently have been awarded bursaries to study law from the top 10 law firms in the UK, who also act as coaches and mentors.
